MANUSCRIPT ACCEPTANCE/REJECTION RATE:

EDITOR'S GOALS AND PROGRESS TOWARD MEETING THOSE GOALS:

My primary goal as I completed my second year as editor was to maintain the large increase in submissions to the journal from the previous year. Because that initial growth was so high (200%) I get my expectations reasonable. However, I am pleased to see the number of submissions actually increased again, indicating the continued growth and stability of the journal. (100 submissions in 2022-2023 and 135 submissions in 2023-2024).

STRENGTHS:

- Submissions have continued to increase.
- The diversity of methodologies and areas of focus have increased in the past year indicating a wider reach for the journal.

AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT:

A number of articles have been delayed this past year due to difficulty in securing appropriate and available reviewers. I believe a focus on expanding the Editorial Board to include more diverse areas of expertise would help this issue as I often find myself looking for reviewers outside of the EdBoard. I believe this can also be improved by increasing my communications with the EdBoard including making the review expectations more prominent and clear.

DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION:

Although I cannot speak to the demographics of article authors due to anonymous review, there has been an increase in the number of articles submitted and accepted that focus on non-US contexts, including work focused on democratic issues in Spain, Norway, Nigeria, and India. I will continue

to encourage submissions from diverse groups of authors as well as submissions that focus on DEI issues as they relate to democracy.

A special issue entitled "Who's STILL Afraid of Critical Race Theory?" will appear next year (Volume 59.2) which will focus extensively of issues of race and epistemology.
